Wētāpunga are too heavy to jump but cave wētā can leap 2m high – that's 50 times their body length!

Hold a wētā race, crawling or jumping with your friends.

Discover what's living in your garden or school grounds by making a tracking tunnel. You can find instructions for how to make one <u>here</u>.


