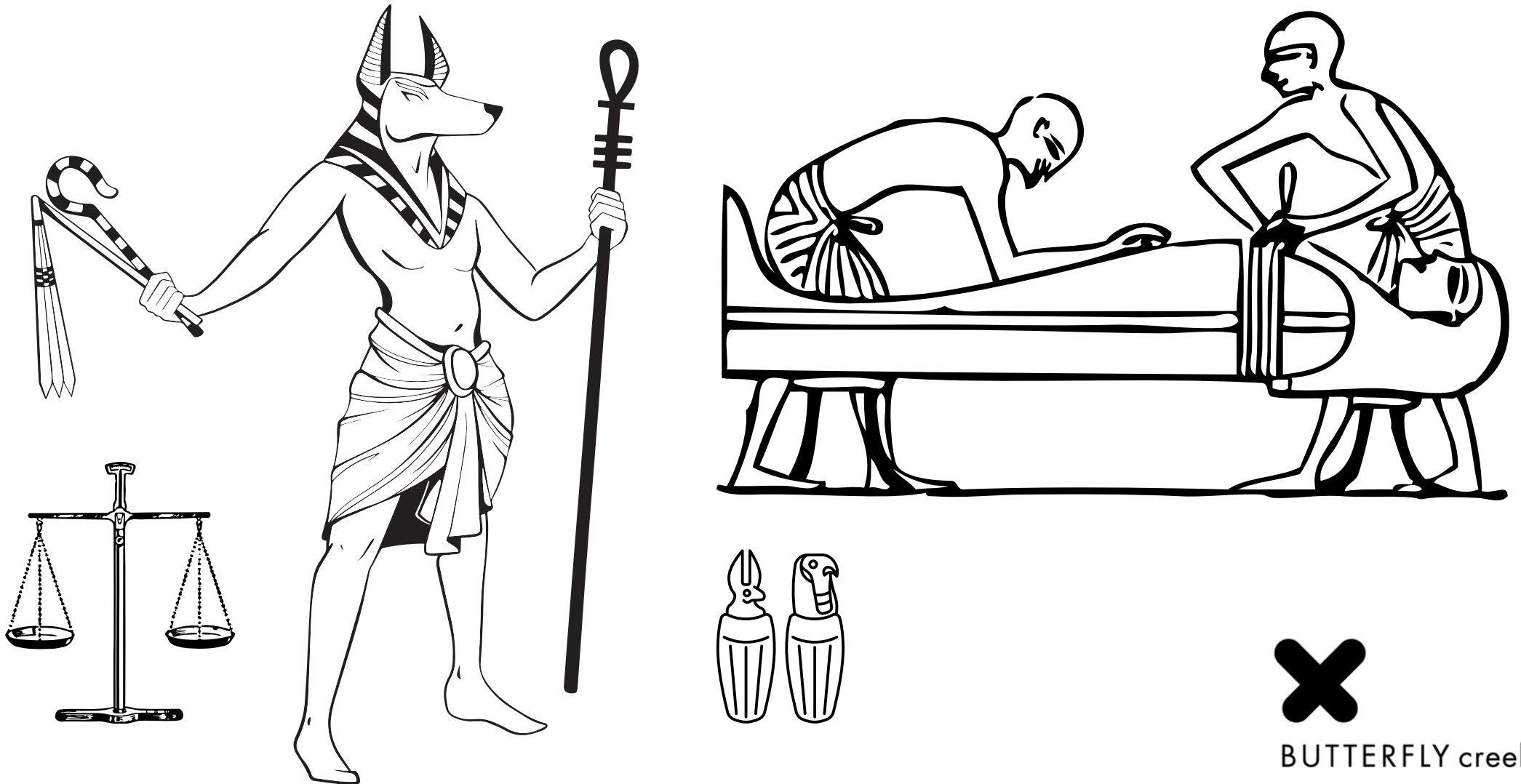


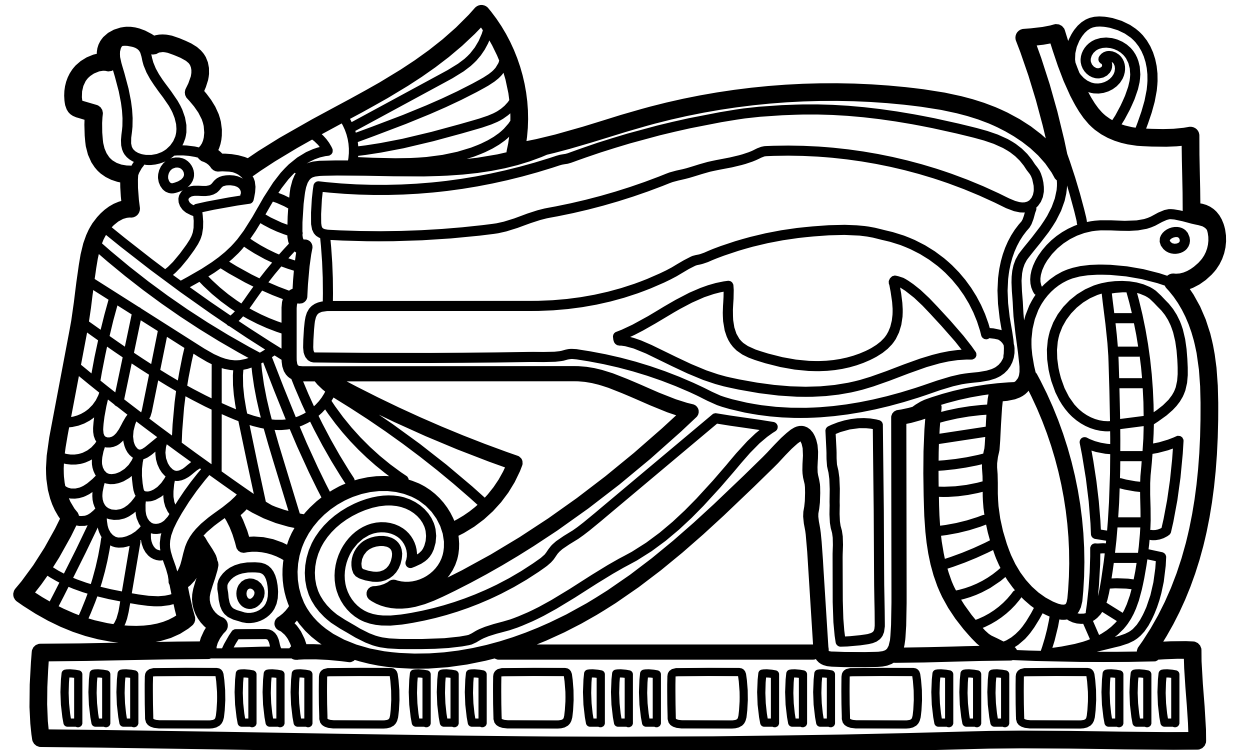
# EGYPTIAN GODS - ANUBIS

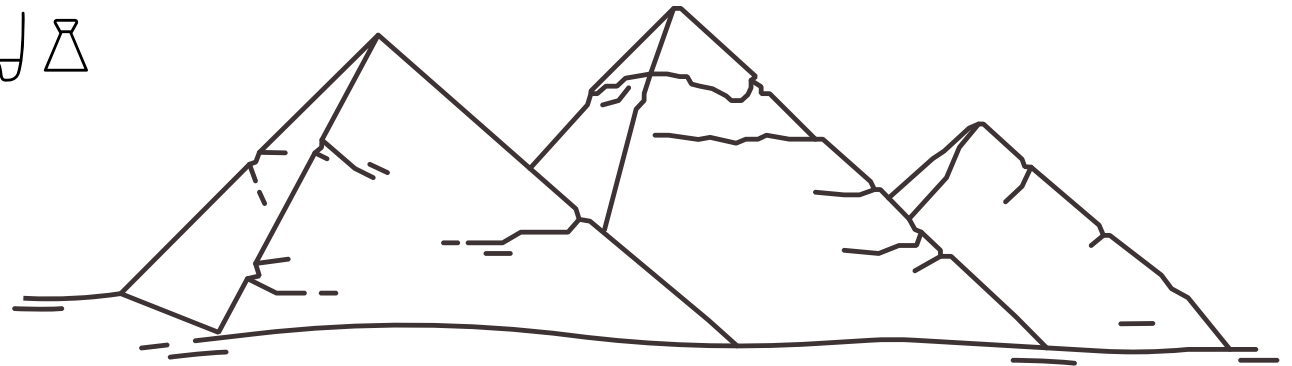
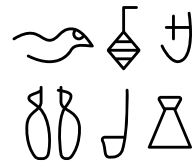
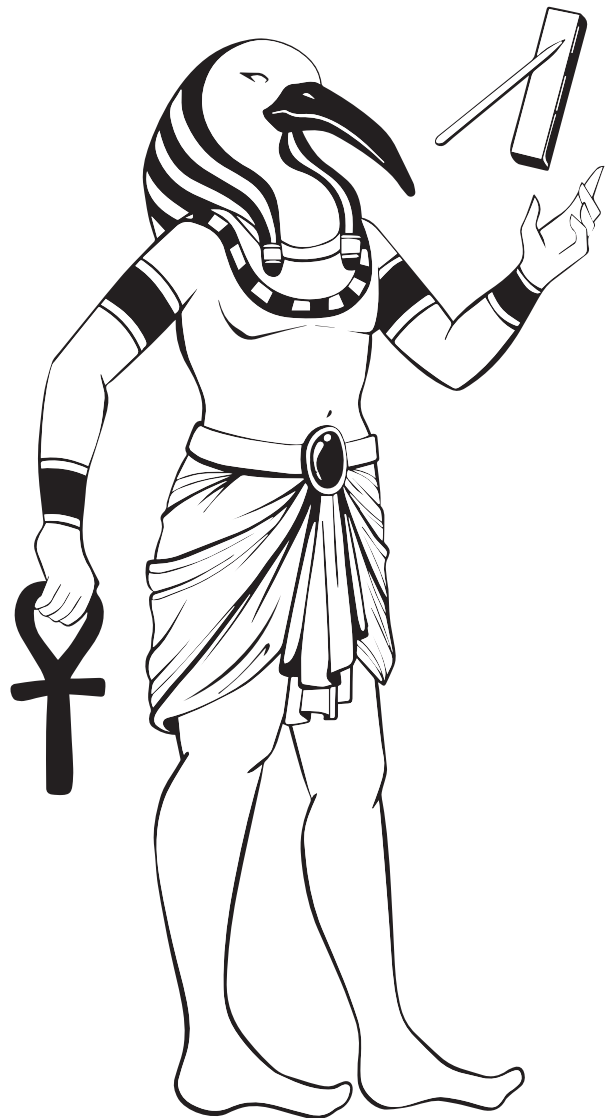
The Eye of Horus is a famous symbol in ancient Egyptian religion that represents well-being, healing, and protection.



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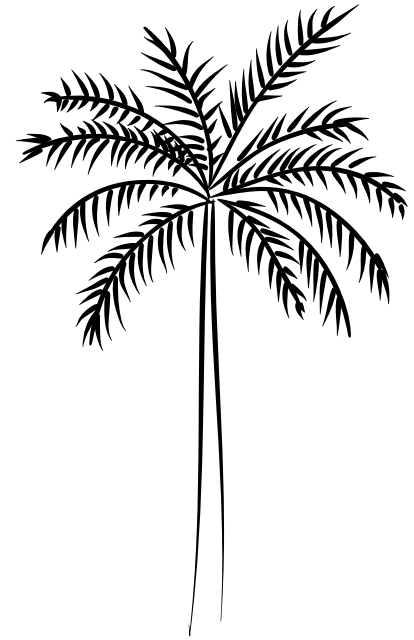
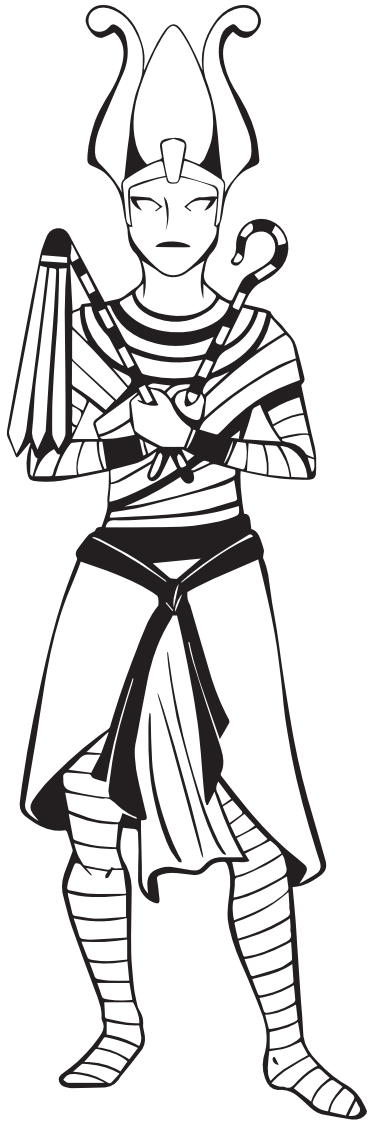
# EGYPTIAN GODS - THOTH

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# EGYPTIAN GODS - KHNUM

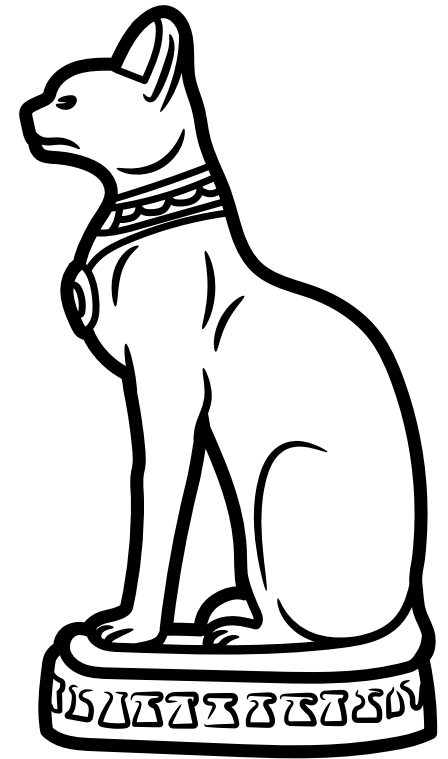
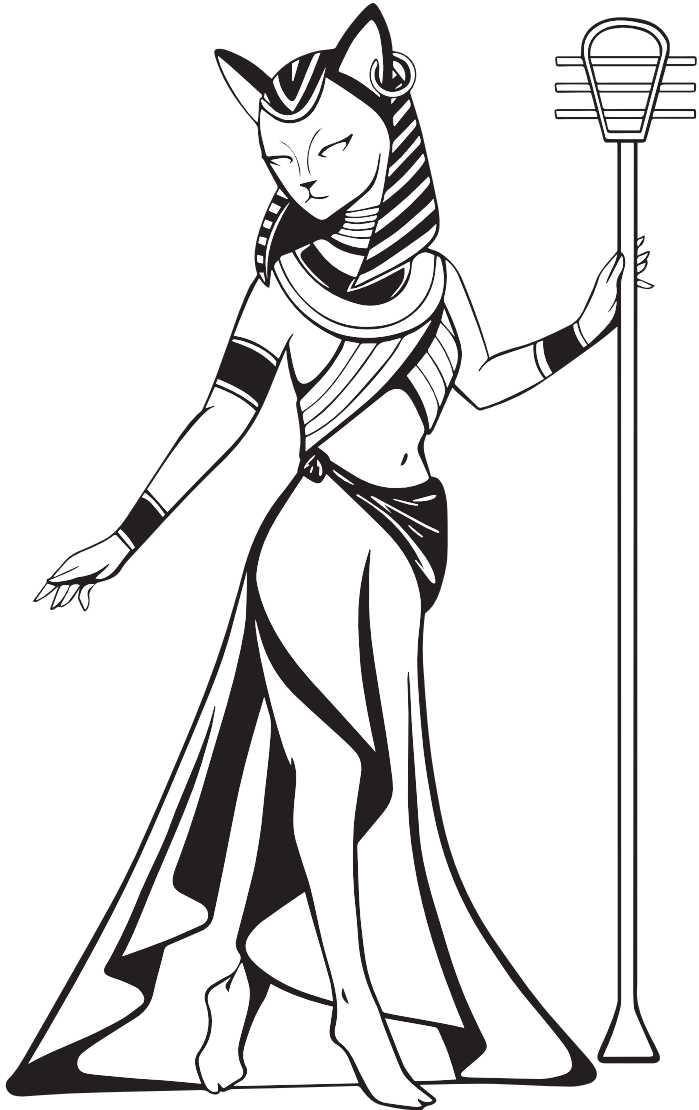
Khnum was originally the god of the source of the river Nile. Since the annual flooding of the Nile brought with it silt and clay, and its water brought life to the land, Khnum was thought to be the creator of the bodies of children, which he made from clay at a potter's wheel. Khnum was usually depicted as a man with a ram's head but was sometimes drawn with a crocodile's head - can you draw this version below?



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# EGYPTIAN GODDESS - BASTET

Bastet was originally a fierce lioness warrior goddess of the sun, worshipped throughout most of ancient Egyptian history. Later she was shown as a cat-headed woman and associated with pregnancy and birth.



Egyptians believed cats were magical creatures, capable of bringing good luck. Wealthy families dressed them in jewels. When the cats died, they were mummified. Draw a picture of a pampered cat above.



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
